

Around the World on a Wednesday

n Wednesday, May 31, young people from the Department of Youth Rehabilitation Services (DYRS) "traveled" to the countries of Myanmar (formerly Burma) in Southeast Asia and Chile in South America by way of their embassies. While in Myanmar, they had the honor of meeting the Ambassador to the United States along with his staff, where they asked questions such as "what does an Ambassador do" and even asked the Ambassador if he was married. While "visiting" Chile, the Diplomat of the country escorted them on a personal tour. The young people learned about a diplomat's many tasks along with how long a diplomat must serve in each country before allowed to return home to Chile. They viewed art work and sculptures created by Chilean artists. They also toured the Ambassador's personal quarters and learned about some of the dangers the country's Ambassadors faced in service. From there, the group toured Embassy Row and even stopped by the DC residence of former President Bill Clinton and former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. Afterward, they went to the Islamic Center of Washington DC and then to the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial where they discussed pillars from the Credible Messenger Initiative, such as why "my life matters" and "the power of the tongue" and how this relates to Dr. King's legacy. Youth completed their day at Marrakech Restaurant where they experienced the exotic tastes of the Moroccan Mediterranean and - to their surprise - actually enjoyed some of the foods that they sampled!
