YSC's Got Talent



n Tuesday, August 14, the DYRS Health Services Administration (HSA) hosted the first-ever agency wide Health Fair. They also tested their fitness knowledge as they visited interactive, health education booths (scoring giveaways such as hand sanitizer and lotion), got body composition analysis, and sought nutritional counseling.
