Reason for Discharge: The reason given in DYRS records for a youth's discharge from a program. A successful completion occurs when a youth is transitioned to alower level of supervision (including placement within the family home, placement within an independent-living program, or if the youth's commitment with DYRS expires). A lateral transfer occurs when a youth is transferred to a programwith a similar level of supervision.



Abscondence: Includes any instance when ayouth is not where he orshe is supposed to be, as agreed to in the Community Release Agreement (including curfew violations and abscondences that did not lead to discharge). Abscondence data was obtained by searching DYRS records for each youth.

Re-arrest: Includes any adult or juvenilere-arrests that occured during the quarter while enrolled in the program. The eventual outcome of the re-arrest is inconsequential to this evaluation. Re-arrest data was obtained by reviewing each youth's records in the CJCC's JUSTIS database.
